

Two trips around Coleshill

Following an unscheduled (but nonetheless extremely interesting) talk about Coleshill by Bryan Lawton, Highworth Historical Society members were invited on two trips around Coleshill, both conducted by the very knowledgeable



and enthusiastic Liza Dibble. The first was on a sunny Sunday morning in April and was a general walk around the village with details about the history of Coleshill House and how it was used



during the Second World War for the training of auxiliaries, directed there, of course, by Highworth's Postmistress, Mabel Stranks. We also had a tour of the model farm and how it operates along with information about Coleshill Organics. The second trip, early one spring evening, was centred around the secret army bunker there and the talk gave us even more detail about the WWII operations, ending with a trip into the secret underground bunker, for those of us physically able and not claustrophobic! Members were fascinated by the information given and commented that we are so lucky to have this important part of our country's history on our doorstep.

Trip to the Nuclear Bunker at Great Bedwyn




On Sunday 24 October, Highworth Historical Society organised a trip to a 'nuclear bunker' at Great Bedwyn. This was a former Royal Observer Corps Post which was in use until 1991. Members were given details of just what would happen if our country had been under nuclear attack - how the explosions would have been recorded, how the fall out would have been tracked and how contact would have been made and information shared with other observation posts in the local area* and all over the country. We were treated

to a descent into the bunker and shown all the equipment that was used until the bunker was decommissioned. Thankfully, none of it ever had to be used in an actual nuclear attack situation and it was extremely interesting to find out exactly what was going on behind the scenes! (* One used to be located in the Bydemill Gardens area).

Highworth's Educational Records

October also saw the educational records that our President, Claire Skinner, brought up to Highworth from their usual resting place in the Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre in Chippenham. From Claire's talk we learnt what resources were available and how lucky we are in having some of the oldest records in the county. It was a wonderful chance to browse through log books, school admission books etc some of which were relatively recent. Some of the



information recorded allowed us to see a part of the migration both in and out of Highworth. It was the first time that these valuable documents had been taken out to venues like ours so we were very fortunate. Claire was so pleased with the interest and response that she has offered to bring the church records up to Highworth, so another such session is being planned.

Tour of Inigo House



On a very cold and wintry morning on Saturday 27th November, Claire and Peter Burke kindly gave a group of HHS members a guided tour of their home, Inigo House, on the High Street. As some of you may remember, Inigo House used to be the Doctor's Surgery in Highworth and Claire and Peter still have many of the instruments and equipment owned and used by former doctors who lived and worked there. The tour was absolutely fascinating and, if HHS members are invited there again, we can thoroughly recommend it — it's definitely worth a visit.

Committee News

The Committee has had another busy year and my heartfelt thanks for their co-operation and support go out to them all - Gillian Miller and Joanne Cook who organise the interesting programme of talks for us and the trips which have taken place throughout the year; Kay Brown, our secretary, who arranged the marvellous Quiz Night which we all

anniversary celebrations we approached the College of Arms to investigate the arms on the font in St Michael's Church. Robert Noel, Lancaster Herald, rose to the challenge, reporting that it is a misunderstood version of the arms of St Osmund – Bishop Osmund of Sarum.

The 4th century 'Highworth Pot' found in the garden of a house in Cricklade Road in 2008, is now in at the Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre at Chippenham for restoration, and appears to have caused quite a lot of excitement amongst the conservators. It has been stabilised and separate tests on the composition of the staples and the contents of the pot are being carried out. In researching Elizabethan Highworth for the May Day event I



came across a remarkable document, one to dream about — a deposition dated 1582. To my complete surprise I came across reference to one Goodson of Maggot Mill who 'was executed by burnynge for the Relligion which the queens Majestie nowe aloweth'. This took place at Lammas in 1504 somewhere in the area of Glebe Place. Highworth's very own martyr.
